Brief Description of the Program of Study:

The Department of Linguistics proposes the creation of an Undergraduate minor in Hindi Studies. The minor in Hindi is being proposed as a single language centered minor similar to minors in other languages (French, German, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese) in the School of Languages, Cultures, and Linguistics.

Justification: Enrollments in the Hindi program have been consistently steady at a rate much higher than the national average and a large number of students have expressed a keen interest in broadening and complementing their disciplinary majors with a minor in Hindi Studies. Adding a minor in Hindi will also expand the scope and focus of International studies at UIUC by offering students the chance to opt for a focused and deeper knowledge of Hindi language and culture that is considered a national priority by the US Department of Education and the federal government. The newly hired Hindi lecturer (Dr. Mishra) has a long experience in teaching Hindi and other related languages (Maithili, Magahi, and Bhoipuri), and literature. Professor Pandharipande is teaching a new course titled "The Language and Culture of India" and Dr. Mishra is developing a new course on Business Hindi (to be taught in Spring 2009). Professor Bhatt has significant research interest in South Asian linguistics and Sociolinguistics. The Department of Linguistics, the Hindi Program, and UIUC have the necessary staff and curricular program to develop a minor in Hindi Studies.

It does not overlap with the South Asian Studies Minor which is a (geographic) area centered minor with courses and instruction on South Asian religions (Hinduism and Islam), Economics, Sociology, History, Gender studies, etc. primarily in English. Also, the change in status of India from a 'Third World'/underdeveloped country to an economic superpower and the entry into India of several US and global corporations in banking, insurance, computer technology, automobile, advertising, consumer goods, agricultural products, etc. has created a significant demand for professionals (from a wide variety of disciplines) who can use their in-depth knowledge of Hindi language and culture in business and social contexts, especially in non metropolitan areas.

Budgetary and Staff Implications:

- a. No additional staff or dollars needed for the proposed minor. The department of Linguistics has a full time instructor of Hindi, Arabic is well-covered, and Sanskrit is handled on a tutorial basis when necessary.
 - b. No impact on internal reallocations (change in class size, teaching loads, student-faculty ratio, etc.) We anticipate no significant changes in class size, teaching loads or student-faculty ratios.
 - c. No effect on course enrollment in other departments- all courses required for the minor are controlled by the Department of Linguistics.
 - d. No impact on library, computer use, laboratory use, equipment, etc. The computer teaching facilities will be adequate for the level of enrollment we expect in the program. Existing library resources are more than adequate for this program, as the university already supports a PhD in Linguistics, a MA in Asian Studies, and an undergraduate minor in South Asian studies.

Requirements:

The minor will require 19-21 hours of coursework:

- 10 hours of Hindi language instruction beyond the 3rd semester.
- 6 hours of Indian/South Asian linguistics (formal linguistics and/or sociolinguistics)
- 3-5 hrs of a language which has been a rich source of vocabulary of Modern Hindi

Prerequisites for the Minor:

Knowledge/ability to enter HNDI 404.

Expected enrollment in the minor: We expect the number of students in the minor to reach 20, with adequate advertising.

Admission to the Minor:

The Coordinator of the Hindi Program will monitor admission to the minor.

Minor Advisor: Coordinator of Hindi Program in consultation with the Head of the Linguistics Department

Certification of successful completion:

The Coordinator of Hindi Program will certify the successful completion of all requirements. The college of the student will confirm whether the minor has been completed, based on the course work designated by LAS. If a Minor Modification Form is needed, LAS will review the course substitutions, in consultation with the Department of Linguistics if needed, and approve completion of the minor with the college of the student.
