

## **Proposal to the Senate Educational Policy Committee**

PROPOSAL TITLE: Revision to BALAS in History of Art, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences

**BRIEF DESCRIPTION:** The Program in the Art History seeks to revise both its degree programs in Art History. This proposal outlines revisions for the BALAS degree in the History of Art, and there are three components to the revision:

1) **Reduce the number of required credit hours from 48 to 39**, in part by reducing the number of required additional LAS Humanities hours from 15 to 9. This reduction is designed to bring the program's hours in line with those of our peer degrees in the humanities, as well as other Art History degrees at peer institutions; 2) Clarify the underlying structural logic of the course of study by making the relative difficulty of course levels more apparent to students. In a series of increasingly focused courses (introductory, upper-level, seminar), the major now provides an easily understandable format for students to move through as they learn how to analyze and interpret visual material and textual evidence from specific cultural and historical settings. To help achieve this goal, we established a new 100-level gateway course, ARTH 110 Introduction to the History of Art and Visual Culture; this course has already been approved and will be taught as part of the School of Art and Design's Foundation Program beginning in Fall 2018, and is included as a core course in this revision to the BALAS degree: 3) Clarify the distinction between the BALAS degree in the History of Art and the BFA/FAA degree in the **History of Art.** We have done this by requiring BALAS Art History majors to take additional LAS Humanities courses and by reducing the required number of studio credits. Students seeking a BFA in Art and Art History must take a significant number of courses in the School of Art and Design, but they are not required to take additional LAS Humanities credits. (Please note that the vast majority of our majors are LAS students);

**Help students move through the curriculum in a timely and productive manner**. Here is one example of such a change: in the current curriculum, the presence of five introductory 100-level courses—of which students had to take three in various combinations—made it confusing for students to understand their requirements and logistically complicated to complete them when courses were not regularly offered. This complication has been eliminated with the presence of one new 100-level course, which is required for everyone. Moreover, as students advance through the curriculum, the new requirement of two seminars also guarantees that all students will receive extensive training in how to write sustained texts on works of art;

2) Bring into alignment the required credit hours for a History of Art major with other similar

humanities programs on campus and at our peer institutions. Current History of Art majors are required to take 48 hours of coursework. The new curriculum reduces that number to 39, which is more similar to required hours in related fields. For instance, at UIUC, the English major requires 42 hours; French Studies, 37 hours; and Religion 30 hours. Our revised History of Art degree is also in keeping with required hours for majors at peer institutions. For instance, the University of Michigan requires 30 credit hours for the major (of which 3 are a studio course and 3 are a supporting humanities class); the University of Iowa requires 13 courses, which at Illinois is the equivalent of 39 hours; the University of California, Berkeley similarly requires 13 courses, or the equivalent of 39 hours;

3) Clarify the distinction between the BALAS degree and the BFA degree offered in FAA. As stated above (in description) the new curriculum requires BALAS students to take additional humanities courses whereas the BFA in FAA requires additional studio and design work. We believe this distinction will help LAS students better understand the nature of their education; that is, that Art History is a discipline firmly situated in the Humanities. The differentiation will also help BFA students understand the interdisciplinary nature of their degree in FAA.

#### **BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:**

### 1) Resources

- a. How does the unit intend to financially support this proposal? Existing faculty and graduate teaching assistants will teach all courses; no new resources will be needed for staffing.
- b. How will the unit create capacity or surplus to appropriately resource this program? If applicable, what functions or programs will the unit no longer support to create capacity? The current curriculum resources are being reassigned. For instance, to accommodate the anticipated increased enrollment in our new introductory course ARTH 110, this class will now be offered every semester and our old introductory courses (e.g. ARTH 111, ARTH 112, ARTH 113, ARTH 114, ARTH 115) will no longer be offered after Fall 2019. (These classes must stay on the books until then so that students who began the degree with the old curriculum have the opportunity to complete it.) All faculty will be expected to periodically teach the new course. Faculty have also redesigned other courses to bring them into alignment with our new curriculum. For instance, some 300- and 400-level lecture courses (such as Post-Impression and Race and Representation) have been redesigned as 400-level seminar courses. Moreover, while we hope our curriculum revision brings in new majors, our numbers are small enough that an increase would not pose a resource problem.

History of Art is an LAS degree advised through FAA, which is a different arrangement than any other LAS degree. ## 2) Resource Implications

**DESIRED EFFECTIVE DATE: Fall 2019** 

- a. Please address the impact on faculty resources including the changes in numbers of faculty, class size, teaching loads, student-faculty ratios, etc. None. In 2017 there were 21 BALAS History of Art majors. In the short term, we anticipate our majors to grow to 30, and then slowly increase to 35 or 40. These numbers will not affect our faculty or resources in any way.
- b. Please address the impact on course enrollment in other units and provide an explanation of discussions with representatives of those units. No Units outside of the School of Art +Design are impacted. With regard to LAS: the new curriculum does reduce the number of required humanities courses that students take outside of Art and Design from 5 to 3, but this will not affect LAS in any substantive way for two reasons: 1) our total numbers are small enough that this reduction will not create a noticeable impact; and 2) the old curriculum allowed students to take humanities courses in other FAA units (such as Landscape Architecture), which the new curriculum does not permit. This means all History of Art majors will take their additional humanities hours in LAS. With regard to FAA: though BALAS majors will have to take their humanities courses in LAS, other FAA units will not feel an impact because the numbers of students affected by this change is quite small. Moreover, our BFA History of Art major (which is half the size of the BALAS degree, and is administered by FAA) will still allow students to take humanities courses in other FAA units.

The Program in Art History is unique at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. Though housed in the School of Art and Design in the College of Fine and Applied Arts, the Program in Art History offers a Bachelor of Arts degree in the History of Art from the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences administers admission to the major in the History or Art; however, the Program in Art History advises all History of Art majors.

General education: Students must complete the <u>Campus General Education</u> requirements including the campus general education language requirement.

Twelve hours of 300- and 400-level courses in the major must be taken on this campus.

Minimum hours required for graduation: 120 hours. Students will complete 40 hours of upperdivision coursework (these hours can be drawn from all elements of the degree).

Departmental distinction: To be eligible for distinction, a student must earn a high grade point average and complete at least 4 semester hours of independent research to write a senior research paper. See the undergraduate adviser for details.

The curriculum in the History of Art requires 120 credit hours and offers a broad historical and cultural education related to the visual and build world. The curriculum provides sound preparation for the graduate study required for museum work or teaching at the college level.
