

# **Proposal to the Senate Educational Policy Committee**

**PROPOSAL TITLE:** Revisions to the BALAS in Philosophy, Department of Philosophy, College of Liberal Arts & Sciences

**BRIEF DESCRIPTION:** This revision proposes the following changes to the major: (1) A reduction/streamlining of course options for required hours in the areas of Logic, Ethical Theories, and Metaphysics/Theory of Knowledge; (2) The addition of a required 3-credit capstone course (PHIL 499); and (3) the reduction of additional hours of required coursework from 15 to 12. The total number of hours for the degree (32) is unchanged. Our goal in making the above changes is to increase the sense of shared experience among our majors while also providing them a common core of philosophical knowledge, the continued flexibility to explore in greater detail areas of particular interest, and a capstone seminar experience.

JUSTIFICATION: The revised requirements for the most part represent a reduction of options in the existing requirements, with an eye to identifying core courses that the department regards as foundational in both practical and theoretical philosophy. For example, rather than three options to satisfy the logic requirement, there would be only one (PHIL 202) going forward. Similarly, with respect to the requirement of one upper-level course in practical philosophy, the department wishes to require PHIL 421 Ethical Theories of all students rather than to have it be one of seven options, as it is currently. The addition of PHIL 499 as a final requirement is intended to provide a capstone experience to all majors in order to further develop their analytical and writing skills.

## **BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:**

1) Resources:

No additional resources are required by the proposed changes.

2) Resource Implications:

In order to be able to offer at least two sections per semester of the proposed Capstone Seminar in Philosophy (open only to majors), the department will reduce its other 400-level offerings from 8–9 per semester to 6–7 per semester. Given that existing 400-level courses in

Philosophy are capped at 35 students but typically enroll between 15 and 25 students each, we anticipate being able to continue to provide a sufficiently diverse set of course offerings at the 400-level that will still meet enrollment demands while also staffing these new Capstone Seminars.

Minimum required major and supporting course work normally equates to 44 hours including at least 32 hours of Philosophy courses

Minimum hours required for graduation: 120 hours. Students will complete 40 hours of upper-division coursework (these hours can be drawn from all elements of the degree).

Departmental distinction:

Students who maintain a GPA  $\geq$  3.5 in the major and receive a grade of A<sub>-</sub> in PHIL 499 will graduate with distinction.

Students who maintain a GPA  $\geq$  3.5 but < 3.7 in the major and receive a grade of A or better in PHIL 499 will graduate with high distinction.

Students who maintain GPA  $\geq$  3.7 in the major and receive a grade of A or better in PHIL 499 will graduate with highest distinction.
