Program Description and Justification

The Classics major has been in place for over 10 years with five ways to pursue the major- Classics major (major in Classics (without a concentration) and the four concentrations in Greek, Latin, Classics, Classical Civilization, and Classical Archeology . Recently, the department reviewed the requirements and found that the number of different concentrations is not effective in communicating to students required courses, often creating confusion among the different concentrations--for example, the number of credit hours, which varied from 30 to 36 across concentrations. Consequently, we are proposing to offer two new concentrations of 32 hours for each and eliminate the existing five concentrations. Our goals are to clarify and simplify the major requirements, making the information delivered to students clearer and more concise. From the three existing language concentrations (Greek, Latin, Classics), we are creating one concentration called Classical Languages; students can choose to focus on Greek, Latin, or both. From the two existing civilization concentrations (Classical Civilization, Classical Archaeology), we are creating one concentration called Classical Civilizations (wherein students can elect a track in Mediterranean Archaeology, or no specialization/track).

The existing concentrations are confusing to students who are often puzzled by having these different categories to choose from. It is our goal to streamline the description of required courses on paper and our website to make it clear to students what is required and supporting coursework. The two concentrations now give flexibility to students who can now acquire focus on a language or, if they choose, archaeology.

The Director of Undergraduate Studies in collaboration with the Committee on Undergraduate Study and the Head of the Department lead the assessment work. All juniors and seniors will be evaluated based on their submission of a portfolio of papers produced for 300-400 level courses in the Spring semesters (including minors, not just majors). An alumni survey in addition to a junior survey is conducted every year.

- 1. Acquire a detailed knowledge of the culture of Ancient Greek, Roman, and neighboring languages and civilizations, especially the broader historical, social, and cultural contexts and their development.
- 2. Acquire familiarity with contemporary methods of cultural and historical analysis to facilitate self-directed inquiry of Ancient Greek, Roman, and neighboring cultures.
- 3. Acquire an awareness of the place of Ancient Greek, Roman, and neighboring cultures in the western tradition in order to understand connections between past and present.
- 4. Acquire an appreciation of how the careful engagement with other cultures can facilitate new ways of understanding and interpreting one's own contemporary culture.
