Revision of the Bachelor of Science in Community Health to update correlates
Program Justification
Why are those changes passessay?
Why are these changes necessary?
This proposal addresses the following three changes in the Community Health undergraduate program: (1) update the list of correlates, (2) add a requirement of at least 9 correlate credits within CHLH, IHLT, KIN, or REHB courses, and (3) change the term "correlates" to "supporting electives".

The current list of correlates does not fully reflect the students' course interests, nor the new offerings in the Department, College, and campus. Therefore, we seek approval to update the list of correlates to include several community health-related courses that were developed after the last revision, and to add additional courses not on the list that Community Health students (including InterCollege Transfers, or ICTs) are interested in taking. Also, we want to update a few courses already on the list that have changed their rubric or number since last revision, as well as, delete a few courses that are no longer being offered. Finally, we want to update the organization of the list of correlates to be easier to follow.

The Community Health Program requires students to complete 18 credits of correlates. In order to further their knowledge in different health-related topics, we would like to establish a requirement that 9 or more correlate credit hours come from courses within the home Department i.e. Kinesiology and Community Health, whereby students will be required to take at least 9 credits with one of the following rubrics: CHLH, IHLT, KIN, or REHB.

In addition, this proposal seeks to change the current term, "correlates", to "supporting electives". Many students have expressed a lack of understanding of this low frequency term. The term correlates in not in common use across Illinois undergraduate programs. More commonly used terms include "restricted electives", "free electives", "supporting electives", and simply "electives". Therefore, we would like to adopt the new term: "supporting electives"

The Community Health Program at the University of Illinois prepares students in the ever changing world of health care and health behavior as practitioners and offers three concentrations at the undergraduate level: Health Education & Promotion, Health Planning & Administration, and Rehabilitation Studies. All curricula are built on a foundation of general education courses which emphasize communication skills and critical thinking. The Professional Core courses are designed to help students develop skills in planning, implementation, and evaluation in the context of health services and programs. Students must complete an internship during their senior year in a setting related to the degree and their interests. Recent internship sites have included the Carle and OSF hospitals, Promise Healthcare, Champaign Urbana Public Health District, American Heart Association, and the American Red Cross Association.

This proposal addresses the following three changes in the Community Health undergraduate program: (1) update the list of correlates, (2) add a requirement of at least 9 correlate credits within CHLH, IHLT, KIN, or REHB courses, and (3) change the term "correlates" to "supporting electives".

The current list of correlates does not fully reflect the students' course interests, nor the new offerings in the Department, College, and campus. Therefore, we seek approval to update the list of correlates to include several community health-related courses that were developed after the last revision, and to add additional courses not on the list that Community Health students (including InterCollege Transfers, or ICTs) are interested in taking. Also, we want to update a few courses already on the list that have changed their rubric or number since last revision, as well as, delete a few courses that are no longer being offered. Finally, we want to update the organization of the list of correlates to be easier to follow.

The Community Health Program requires students to complete 18 credits of correlates. In order to further their knowledge in different health-related topics, we would like to establish a requirement that 9 or more correlate credit hours come from courses within the home Department i.e. Kinesiology and Community Health, whereby students will be required to take at least 9 credits with one of the following rubrics: CHLH, IHLT, KIN, or REHB.

In addition, this proposal seeks to change the current term, "correlates", to "supporting electives". Many students have expressed a lack of understanding of this low frequency term. The term correlates in not in common use across Illinois undergraduate programs. More commonly used terms include "restricted electives", "free electives", "supporting electives", and simply "electives". Therefore, we would like to adopt the new term: "supporting electives".


