EP.23.072 Report of Administrative Approvals through April 17, 2023

Senate committees are authorized to act for and in the name of the Senate on minor matters. Below is a listing of the administrative approvals the Senate Committee on Educational Policy approved at its meeting on April 17. For each program listing, there is no change to the total hours required. Additional information for each approval is attached.

#### A. <u>Undergraduate Programs</u>

- Revise the Bachelor of Science in Materials Science and Engineering in the Grainger College of Engineering (key 122) – removes deactivated courses, updates elective lists, and revises the senior design requirement.
- 2) Revise the Bachelor of Science in Computer Science + Advertising in the College of Media and the Grainger College of Engineering (key 571) adds optional course to core course, removes one core course, adds 2 elective courses, and revises course numbers to align with approved course revisions.
- 3) Revise the Undergraduate minor in Game Studies & Design in the School of Information Science (key 1069) replaces one course with one course in meeting the 100-200 level historical/social perspectives requirement and brings the course elective list into the program of study for increased transparency and accessibility.
- 4) Eliminate the Undergraduate Minor Electives List for Game Studies & Design in the School of Information Science (key 1070) eliminates separate CIM P record for elective list and moves the elective list into the Undergraduate minor in Game Studies & Design (key 1069) for increased transparency and accessibility.
- 5) Revise the Bachelor of Musical Arts in Lyric Theatre in the College of Fine and Applied Arts (key 523) adds several new courses, updates rubrics and course numbers, removes deactivated courses, revises the music theory curriculum sequence, removes footnotes for accessibility, and adds which concentrations are available for this major within the Program of Study table for increased transparency.
- 6) Revise the concentration in Performance in the Bachelor of Musical Arts in Lyric Theatre in the College of Fine and Applied Arts (key 677) moves the 12 hours of required concentration coursework into electives, adds more elective choices, and for transparency, adds the major requirements into the Program of Study table.
- 7) Revise the concentration in Creative in the Bachelor of Musical Arts in Lyric Theatre in the College of Fine and Applied Arts (key 678) moves the 3 required courses in the concentration coursework into an elective area, updates rubric and course number, adds more elective course choices and for transparency, adds the major requirements into the Program of Study table.
- 8) Revise the Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Arts and Sciences in Global Studies in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (key 498) adds required College course, adds course lists and removes website references/links, changes category titles and expands the disciplines under them, adds additional course option in the senior capstone section, changes minimum major hour range (not overall credit hours for

- the program), and transfers this program from the Liberal Arts and Sciences to the Global Studies Programs & Courses.
- Revise the Undergraduate Minor in Global Studies in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (key 500)
   adds course lists, revises category titles and expands the disciplines under them, removes website references/links, and transfers this program from the Liberal Arts and Sciences to the Global Studies Programs & Courses.
- 10) Revise the Undergraduate Minor in Global Markets and Society in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences (key 499) adds course lists, updates rubric change, removes website references/links, and transfers this program from the Liberal Arts and Sciences to the Global Studies Programs & Courses.

The topical lecture lists are updated to reflect changes in course offerings in MSE and related disciplines. The current senior design course (MSE 395, 3 credits) is being replaced by a two-semester sequence, MSE 494 (1 credit) and MSE 495 (2 credits). In reviewing MSE 395 through coursework and interviews with faculty, students, and alumni, it has been determined that the one-semester capstone design had deficiencies. In addition, the most recent ABET accreditation review, (2019), pointed specifically to issues in our senior design offering.

At the course level, various measures of student performance, and attainment of learning objectives will be used, including a selfassessment form filled out by students upon declaration of the minor, and another upon completion of the degree requirements, regarding their experience with and mastery of concepts and skills. Grades, homework assignments and class projects as well as exhibitions and presentations of student work will take place on a regular basis and will provide an additional source of data.

Evaluation of the program will take place in a two year rotation between (year one) macro-level analysis of curriculum, and (year two) a more focused scrutiny of course content/syllabi. In both years, an agile "Assessment and Action," process will occur during which assessment data will be analyzed and used to make programmatic or course changes as quickly as possible, to improve student learning in relationship to our stated outcomes. An Assessment and Action report will be prepared each Spring by the Program Coordinator, with the support of the Curriculum committee and will be

shared with the Steering committee and the Director of Informatics.

The salaries for the Program Coordinator, administrative assistant, and specialized teaching faculty member would be supported in part by IU cost recovery from three high enrollment undergraduate courses that will be controlled by Informatics. Other core and elective courses will be staffed and funded by tenure track, specialized teaching and adjunct faculty in their home departments, which will receive the IUs. Hello Dr. Sotirovic,

I am the Director of the Game Studies & Design Program. Our curriculum committee is currently reviewing the core requirements and electives for our undergraduate minor program. When we set up the GSD Minor, we included Christopher Ball's course on Interactive Media, now the asynchronous course, JOUR 101 as a core required course. After review, the curriculum committee has recommended that we shift JOUR 101 from being a core course (which fulfills the historical/social perspectives requirement) to being an elective course. The committee's reasons for this recommendation had to do with a strong preference for in-person format for core courses over an asynchronous format, and the need for equivalency of game-related course content in our required course options. The other two courses that fulfill the same requirement (currently Social History of Games & Gaming, and Introduction to the Game Industry) have significantly more game-related content than JOUR 101.

We would like JOUR 101 to remain an elective in the minor, however, where it can continue to serve as a gateway course for journalism majors and other students taking it for Gen-Ed credit, into the game studies program.

In order to make this change in the Minor requirements, we need an acknowledgment of this change from you to attach to our revision plan. Would you be able to provide that? An email response should be sufficient.

We are systematically cleaning up all of our undergraduate programs since the School of Music added a first semester eight-week course for music majors, created a new rubric (MUSC) for applied lesson and ensembles courses previously in the MUS rubric, and revised the music theory curriculum sequence. We have also created more flexibility in the selection of courses for either BMA concentration, moving away from required courses in these two areas. We are also pulling all relevant footnotes up into the curricula tables as per recommendation from the Registrar's Office.

The Department of Dance also recently revised their dance courses and curricula, so these course updates are now captured in the curriculum.

- (1) Adding MUS 100 (First-year Seminar for Music Majors, 0 cr). We created a POTB course for all new music majors. The course picks up where FAA 101 finishes midsemester. MUS 100 allows us to converse with our new music majors in their first semester and identify any concerns or issues they may have about life as a music major. This course is now part of all of our undergraduate music degrees.
- (2) Adding MUS 202 (Music Theory and Practice IV, 2 cr) to this program. We are back to a four-semester music theory sequence and have reformatted all four semesters of music theory (MUS 101, 102, 201, 202) to begin with a course which centers on music literacy and music technology. Over the last few years we have been monitoring how well our students have been progressing in music theory, one of the most important core areas of a music degree. And, as the University has opened the admissions pathways for a more diverse set of entering students, we found we needed to create a new music theory sequence which did not assume students have had basic music theory training in music literacy and technology before their matriculation to UIUC.
- (3) Deleting MUS 454 (Advanced Keyboard Skills I, 2 cr) from the Music Core of the BMA. This course is a holdover from the previous generic Music Core which required a listing of this course in the Keyboard Studies area. MUS 454 is required for BMUS-Instrumental Music piano performance majors only. Any LTI students who play piano would fulfill the keyboard requirement by either passing the piano proficiency exam and/or completing MUS 172 (Group Instruction Piano for Music Majors I) and MUS 173 (Group Instruction Piano for Music Majors II).
- (4) Replacing old MUS lesson and ensemble course numbers with the new corresponding MUSC rubric and number: Replace "MUS 181 (Voice, 2 or 3 cr)" with "MUSC 105 (Voice, 2 or 3 cr)"; Replace "MUS 467 (Lyric Theatre Voice, 2 cr)" with "MUSC 406 (Lyric Theatre Voice, 2 cr)"; Replace "MUS 468 (LTI Studio, 2 cr)" with MUSC 468 (LTI Studio, 2 cr); Replace "MUS 468 B (Opera Studio, 2 cr)" with "MUSC 468 (LTI Studio, 2 cr)".
- (5) Replacing retired dance courses, "DANC 101-102 (Modern I and II, 2 cr each)/DANC 107-108 (Ballet I and II, 2 cr each)," with "DANC 116 (Dance I, 2 cr) or DANC 216 (Dance II, 2 cr)." DANCE 116 is a beginning dance course with many sections: ballet, modern, improvisation, ballroom. DANC 216 is an intermediate dance course with many sections: ballet, modern, improvisation, ballroom.
- (6) Adding a note in the curriculum table about MUSC 468 (LTI Studio, 2 cr): "Years 2 and 3"
- (7) Adding notes for DANC 209 (Lyric Theatre Dance, 2 cr): "Taken after 2 semesters of DANC 116 and/or DANC 216."
- (8) Pulling all relevant footnotes into the curriculum table.

- (4) Adding MUS 106 (Beginning Composition, 2 cr) and MUS 206 (Indermediate Composition, 2 cr) to the list of electives;
- (5) Adding MUS 469 (Lyric Theatre Production, 2 or 3 cr), MUSC 469 (LTI Main Stage, 1 or 2 cr);

- (6) Stating all elective Acting courses now appear under "Additional Acting courses (THEA)";
- (7) Stating all elective Dance courses now appear under "Additional Dance courses (DANC)"; and

In the POS, we are adding the required college orientation course, adding course lists and removing website references/links, changing category titles and expanding the disciplines under them, adding an additional course option in the senior capstone section, and changing minimum major hour range but not overall credit hours for the

program.

Why are these changes necessary?

The College of LAS has previously requested that the LAS Global Studies Programs and Courses (1-563) be transferred into the LAS Illinois Global Institute (IGI KV6). The transfer would facilitate closer collaboration between the Global Studies programs and the ten international area and global studies center and thematic programs in the IGI, several of which have complementary undergraduate and graduate programs and all of which are involved in programming, community engagement, and support for research that advance the university's goals in fostering global awareness and collaboration.

Also request that the Global Studies Minor, UG (5206), the Global Markets and Society Minor, UG (5527), and the Global Studies, BALAS (10KV5206BALA) be transferred into 1-563 LAS Global Studies Programs and Courses as these programs currently reside in 1-670 LAS Courses. The Global Studies Minor, GR (5983), also residing in 1-670 LAS Courses, is to be transferred into the Center for Global Studies (1-535).

Changes are also being made to the POS. Due to new guidance from campus for student transparency and clarity, courses in a list are added to POS and website links removed. In the POS, we are also adding the required college orientation course, changing category titles and expanding the disciplines under them (because of new courses becoming available), adding an additional course option in the senior capstone section, and changing the overall minimum major hours (Note: the overall credit hours are not changing).

- There is nothing fundamental about the changes being made, we just wanted to make it more clear to the students to help them differentiate between GLBL courses and social science foundations from other units.
- LAS 494 is being added to the Optional Senior Capstone because it is an independent study with faculty mentors across the College of LAS.

The transfer would facilitate closer collaboration between the Global Studies programs and the ten international area and global studies center and thematic programs in the IGI, several of which have complementary undergraduate and graduate programs and all of which are involved in programming, community engagement, and support for research that advance the university's goals in fostering global awareness and collaboration.

The College of LAS has previously requested that the LAS Global Studies Programs and Courses (1-563) be transferred into the LAS Illinois Global Institute (IGI KV6). The transfer would facilitate closer collaboration between the Global Studies programs and the ten international area and global studies center and thematic programs in the IGI, several of which have complementary undergraduate and graduate programs and all of which are involved in programming, community engagement, and support for research that advance the university's goals in fostering global awareness and collaboration.


