Why are these changes necessary?

These courses have been taught as X98 courses and are now at a point to be listed as permanent course numbers. As such, this minor curriculum revision is reflecting this change. Further, since a new field of "Minimum Total Credit Hours for the Program" has populated in the CIM Programs since the last revision, we have responded with 158 credit hours. At this time, the ILEE program is intended as a dual degree for engineering students. Students must complete all requirements specified for the primary engineering degree, and 31 hours for the second (ILEE) degree, for a minimum of 158 credit hours.

Additionally, an alternative course (TE 200: Introduction to Innovation) is being added as an option for a required course (TE 100: Introduction to Innovation, Leadership, and Engineering Entrepreneurship). These courses have a similar learning objective of introducing students to fundamental concepts in entrepreneurship, creativity, and innovation and include a team innovation project. TE 200 is restricted to Innovation Living Learning Community students and is a recommended course for students living in this LLC.
