PROPOSAL TITLE: Modifications to five undergraduate Bachelor of Science concentrations in the Department of Agricultural and Consumer Economics

- BRIEF DESCRIPTION: Revisions to five concentrations in the Department of ACE: Agri-Accounting; Finance in Agribusiness; Policy, International, Trade and Development; Consumer Economics and Finance; Public Policy and Law
- 1) <u>Revision to the Agri-Accounting concentration</u>: Add ACE 231 (Food and Agribusiness Management) as a requirement (see Appendix A).
- 2) Revision to the Finance in Agribusiness concentration: Add ACE 427 (Commodity Price Analysis) to the list of classes from which students must choose 2 (see Appendix A).
- 3) <u>Revision to the Policy, International, Trade and Development concentration</u>: Eliminate the specific requirement that students take either ACE 454 (Economic Development of Tropical Africa) or ACE/ECON 452 (The Latin American Economies); add those classes instead to a list from which students must choose two (see Appendix A).
- 4) <u>Revision to Consumer Economics and Finance Concentration</u>: Add ACE 444 (Financial Services and Investment Planning), ACE 345 (Financial Decisions for Individuals and Small Businesses), and ACE 346 (Tax Policy and Financial Planning) to the list of classes from which students must choose two (see Appendix.)
- 5) <u>Revision to Public Policy and Law Concentration</u>: Add ACE 306 (Food Law) to the second list of classes from which students must choose one (see Appendix A).

JUSTIFICATION:

Rationale for the change to the Agri-Accounting concentration: ACCY 304 is already a requirement for that concentration, and that course already requires either ACE 231 or BADM 310 as a prerequisite. This change to the concentration makes a hidden requirement explicit. Although technically the hours required for the concentration do increase, the hours required to fulfill requirements of the B.S. degree do not (see the Appendix B showing degree requirements). We are adding only ACE 231 as a requirement, but if a student happens to have had BADM 310 (for example, because they were in the business minor) that class will automatically be accepted in place of ACE 231.

Rationale for the change in the Finance in Agribusiness concentration: ACE 427 is a good fit for the concentration and the addition of the course to the list of those from which students can choose gives the students more flexibility in satisfying their major requirements. The revision keeps the number of required hours constant.

Rationale for the change in the Policy, International, Trade and Development concentration: The instructor for ACE 454 has retired so that course is no longer being taught, and the instructor for ACE/ECON 452 (cross listed as ACE 452) passed away. This modification keeps ACE/ECON 452 in the list of options but does not specifically require it; that will protect students from being in a position where they are unable to satisfy their degree requirements because neither of those classes is available. The revision keeps the number of required hours and required 400-level hours constant.

Rationale for the change in the Consumer Economics and Finance concentration: These three classes are a good fit for the concentration; adding them to the list of choices gives students more flexibility in satisfying their major requirements and increases the number of courses related to finance that they can take. The revision keeps the number of required hours constant.

Rationale for the change in the Public Policy and Law concentration: ACE 306 is a good fit for this concentration and did not exist when the concentration was established; adding it to the list of choices gives students more flexibility in satisfying their major requirements. The revision keeps the number of required hours constant.

No additional financial support is needed. Any classes being added to concentrations are already being taught in ACE and have room for more students.

All the classes being added already have capacity to accommodate the additional students that might take them as a result of these changes.

This is not relevant – no financial arrangements are needed.

A few of the ACE classes added to concentration lists might get slightly larger, but the changes will not alter the character of those classes.

The change to the PITD concentration might reduce the number of students enrolled in ACE/ECON 452, but the ECON department is not even sure they will be offering that class beyond the next academic year. (See communication in Appendix C.)

The change to the Agri-Accounting concentration will not have any impact on enrollments in any classes in the College of Business at all. It is not a real change – it just takes current prerequisites for a required course and makes them visible in the description of the concentration.
