

Sponsoring Unit: ACES Academic Programs
Date: March 28, 2002

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Brief Description of the Program of Study:

This minor will help students prepare for life and work in a global society and will provide the international skills that employers expect of our graduates. While it is the intent of this minor to encourage students to spend time abroad and to develop proficiency in a foreign language, neither is required. Students enrolled in this minor will be able to draw on resources outside the college as well as a variety of courses offered by the seven departments in the College of ACES.

4. Minimum total hours = 21. At least 12 hours of the 21 credit hours required for this minor must come from College of ACES courses.

5. At least 6 hours of the total required for this minor must be earned through 300-level coursework.

Prerequisites for the Minor:

Students who are enrolled in any curriculum in the College of ACES, or any college on campus, will have the opportunity to complete the ACES International Minor and have that qualification recorded on their transcript.

Expected Enrollment in the Minor: 20 Students

Admission to the Minor:

This minor will be administratively based in ACES Academic Programs, and student advising will take place in that unit. An Assistant Dean will work with each student to plan a program of study that consists of a coherent pattern of coursework and other experiences. Students on probation will not be admitted to this minor.

Minor Advisor:

Student advising will be done by the ACES Academic Programs Assistant Dean for Study Abroad. General oversight responsibility for this minor will rest with the International Minor in ACES Committee (IMAC). The IMAC will consist of the Study Abroad Advisor from each ACES department, with the Assistant Dean for Study Abroad as Chair.


Certification of Successful Completion:

The College of ACES Academic Programs Office will certify completion of the minor by ACES majors. Students from other colleges will be certified in their home college.
