Revision of the Scandinavian Studies Concentration of the German Major, Department of Germanic Languages and Literatures, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences.

BRIEF DESCRIPTION:

1. The Scandinavian Studies Concentration requires 30 credit hours beyond SCAN 101-102 (prerequisite first-year language courses, or the equivalent as approved by advisor).

Courses required for the concentration

- a) <u>Language courses (11-12 credit hours)</u> SCAN 103-104 SCAN 494
- b) 200-level courses (6 credit hours) Choose from SCAN 215, 225, 251, 252.
- c) <u>300- or 400-level courses (12-13 credit hours)</u> Choose from SCAN 375, 463, 464, 490, 492, and 496
- 21 credits of supporting course work comprised of study in areas relevant for Scandinavian Studies, chosen in collaboration with the Scandinavian Studies faculty advisor. Possible areas include Germanic Languages and Literatures, English, Linguistics, History, Political Science, Comparative and World Literature, International and Area Studies, European Studies, etc.
- 3. The current Program of Study statement now indicates: "minimum required major and supporting course work normally equates to 45-57 hours with at least 30 hours in German." This is not true for this concentration. The Program of Study below has been revised to read as follows: "Minimum required major and supporting course work normally equates to 45-57 hours with at least 30 hours in German except for the concentration in Scandinavian Studies."

JUSTIFICATION for Revision:

The revisions to the Scandinavian Studies Concentration better reflect the program's current offerings and staff availability. The revisions to the concentration will make it easier for students to complete all requirements, thus ensuring that students practically have the option to pursue the concentration. The concentration has had very few majors during the last decades, at least partly because the old requirements do not match the available course offerings.

There is good reason to include the SCAN 103-104 in the concentration, since very few students will have studied a Scandinavian language at the high school level. Their commitment to studying four semesters of language at the college level should thus be rewarded by counting the second-year classes toward the concentration. At the end of four semester of Scandinavian language learning, students achieve a very high standard of proficiency, well comparable to fifth- and sixth-semester language instruction in other languages.

Rather than requiring students a year of study abroad at a Scandinavian university, the revised concentration is possible to complete on the University of Illinois campus. Because the 300- and 400-level SCAN literature/film/culture courses are taught by a limited number of faculty members (usually Anna Stenport, only) and on a rotating schedule (usually every fourth semester), some flexibility in the requirements must be allowed. In practice, completion of the concentration will usually involve one semester of study abroad, allowing students to take advantage of the University's exchange program with Uppsala University (or other Scandinavian universities, as applicable).

BUDGETARY AND STAFF IMPLICATIONS:

NONE. It is expected that the revised concentration will initially lead only to a slight increase in
the number of concentration majors and that the current staff, class size, student-faculty ratio,
facilities use, library and computer facilities, and student enrollment will be able to absorb that
increase.
